CELEBRATING 25 YEARS OF THE HARLAN P. KELSEY ARBORETUM!



This year, we celebrate several legacies. In 2000, Loren and Sally Wood had the foresight to donate and create a Conservation Restriction on 4.2 acres of Harlan P. Kelsey's original Boxford Nursery on Kelsey Road, known as the Harlan P. Kelsey Arboretum. That same year, the non-profit organization Horticultural Society of Boxford was deeded that Conservation Restriction to preserve and conserve Mr. Kelsey's original 100+ year-old plantings and trees in a natural environment. We celebrate the endurance of the land, its plantings and its natural environment as a free public oasis for enjoyment and education. Last, but not least, we celebrate the man, Harlan Page Kelsey - and his visions.

<u>Harlan Page Kelsey – From Beginnings to Boxford</u> Harlan Kelsey was not your typical resident who

moved to Boxford to grow and sell plants. It began in 1632 when his 6th great-grandfather, William Kelsey, and several families fled England's religious persecution to settle Cambridge in the Massachusetts Bay Colony. In 1636, William and those same families ventured west and founded Hartford CT. Several years later William was granted land along Long Island Sound to settle another town, Clinton CT. As the Kelsey generations grew, they moved west for new farmland. Harlan's great-grandfather created the first apple orchard in NY in Great Valley with Johnny Appleseed's seeds. His grandfather expanded the orchard, but concerned about conserving the natural environment, began buying virgin forest land to "save the trees from the new settlers axes". Harlan's Dad, Samuel, managed the orchard while learning horticulture and landscaping. As the southwest opened, the Santa Fe Railroad hired Samuel to plant trees along their Kansas RR lines and settle the




town of Ottawa KS, where he helped create the University of Ottawa. Samuel met a missionary's daughter, married and had four children, with Harlan and his twin brother Harry, the youngest, born in 1872. When malaria hit, Samuel moved his family to North Carolina and co-founded the town of Highlands, NC in the Smoky Mts.

There, Samuel gave teenage Harlan land for a nursery of "native" rhododendrons and azaleas, which he transplanted from the mountains – the first Highlands Nursery. Harlan's horticultural and environmental education came from renowned botanists who came to the area for scientific study and research. Confused by the different names these botanists gave to the same plant, he wrote his first book, "Standardized Plant Names", revisions of which became standard for all plant growers, even today.

His growing nursery of "native plants" and his landscape architecture expertise caught the eye of wealthy clients all along the eastern seaboard. A northern nursery was needed. Salem, MA was selected, but he soon outgrew this nursery. Looking for another area, he learned of several farms for sale in Boxford. Now married (Florence Low) with four children, the move was made. His new Boxford Highlands Nursery along Georgetown, Ipswich and Kelsey Roads opened in 1928 and grew to 500 acres in the 1930's, including an airstrip in Cadet Field. Being a nurseryman was



not enough for Harlan. In his landscape architecture work, he saw the natural environment being ravaged by development. He was determined to conserve land in its natural state wherever he could. Thus, he led the extension and maintenance of the Appalachian Trail and was instrumental in the creation of the



National Park Service through which he had designated the Shenandoah, Smoky Mts., Everglades, Monmouth Caves, and White Mts. as National Parks. After a devastating fire in Salem, he bought Derby Wharf, which he restored and had designated as America's very first National Historic Site. For Salem's 300th anniversary, he helped build Pioneer Village, donating trees from his Boxford nursery. Harlan died in 1958. Amid these and other accomplishments, he took little publicity, feeling it his duty to respect God's world and be involved in keeping it beautiful. Looking back today, he would be pleased to know that many people visit and enjoy the national parks. His legacy gift to Boxford is the preservation of his last nursery acreage, the Harlan P. Kelsey Arboretum, for all to visit, learn about and enjoy.
